Local Color

A number of Plainsboro artists will be involved in the library's summer program for children this year. Embracing the theme, "Local Color", summer activities will begin on June 19, with the Shakespeare Theatre's presentation of "Romeo and Juliet." (See story, this page.)

As a literary term, local color can be "the customs, manner of speech, dress, or other typical features of a place or period that contribute to its particular character." In an artistic sense, local color is "the natural color of something in ordinary daylight, uninfluenced by any nearby colors."

During July, these two concepts of local color will be incorporated into children's storytimes, a writing workshop, arts and crafts activities, origami art, and a gardening project for both kids and adults.

Liz Adams will lead a workshop on paper bead making that will focus on the **color** wheel; Tatiana Sougakova will combine the use of **color** and local fauna into a sequence of craft workshops that will develop into a collaborative art installation at the library's fall arts festival; and poet Eloise Bruce will focus on the presence of **color** in literature and in the world at large. Plainsboro resident Nelly Kouzmina, an award-winning fiber artist who uses natural dyes in her work, will hold workshops on the use of dyes and the process of felt making.

A number of other artists will take part in the Plainsboro Library's annual summer program of art, theater, and science projects for children.

Science experiments will use local materials; and young artists may depict local scenes. In addition, the artists will be invited to work outside — *en plein air*—to draw or paint local scenery.

Shakespeare Theatre

Actors from the Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey's professional training program, the Next Stage Ensemble, will perform twice at the Plainsboro Public Library this summer.

The first performance, William Shakespeare's immortal "Romeo and Juliet" will take place on June 19, at 7 p.m. Shakespeare's story of doomed young love in 13th century Verona is one of Shakespeare's most gripping and moving tragedies.

A second production, Pierre de Marivaux' "The Triumph of Love," will take place on Friday, July 31, at 7 p.m. The play concerns Princess Leonide, who must disguise herself as a boy to win the hand of the man she loves. Mistaken identities, bumbling clowns, and new-found infatuations make this lighthearted farce a wonderful summer treat.

The Ensemble, a troupe of young actors just beginning their careers, presents plays in communities throughout New Jersey during the summer months.

As a focus on literacy development, one program will be based on WW-P school district's required reading lists for elementary students. Children will have the opportunity to attend read-aloud sessions in a relaxed atmosphere with Librarian Colleen Hackett, who will make selections from the K-3rd grade list as well as one from the 4th-5th grade list.

Summer favorites that will return include the Spelling Bee, Pringle Packing

contest, and Improvmania, an improvisational theatre workshop for children led by library creative drama teacher Emily Vorp. There will be invention challenges, and numerous other art and craft activities.
